Pink LACE Project Lesbians Affected by Cancer Explored

The Pink LACE project is funded by the Australian Government through Cancer Australia's Building Cancer Support Networks Initiative: Better Cancer Support Through Consumers".

The *Pink LACE Project* an initiative of ACON Northern Rivers, aimed to reduce the impact of cancer on lesbians and same sex attracted women in the Northern Rivers region of NSW by improving linkages between support networks and access to support, by identifying barriers and by building capacity within the community and service sector.

It's important to recognise that being a lesbian or same-sex attracted women is not a health problem, but the experience of homophobia and discrimination can be. As a group, we experience lower health outcomes compared to our heterosexual counterparts but as a community we continue to demonstrate considerable strength and resilience.



Recommendations of the Pink LACE Project

- Strengthen partnerships with health providers by providing information and training to recognise the role of sexuality, community and family of choice when working with lesbian and same sex attracted women;
- Increase knowledge for community and health providers of the services available;
- Advocate for the need for further research to expand evidence base on the health needs of lesbians and the importance of statistic data collection;
- Increase information to lesbians and same sex attracted women to build on and develop community networks.
